Cultural Notes Oct.-Nov.

Cymbidium Culture with Ann Orkid

In the space of four weeks we have gone from low level snow to high fire weather alerts. The hot dry winds will dry your plants fairly quickly so a good watering is a must. Although I have many cymbidiums out in full sun at the moment I will be putting some shade on them in the next month. Remember to water according to weather, size of pot and potting mix. Some mixes are more open and require more frequent watering while those pots

with mixes in a little more advanced stage of decay will retain more water. The main thing to remember is that the mix remains MOIST at all times, not WET or DRY.

The finger down the inside of the pot is a reliable guide to whether a pot needs watering. Watch the smaller pots as they can dry out very quickly. I would recommend watering every two or three days.

Any of the commercial fertilizers can now be used on a regular basis but half strength once a week is usually sufficient. If there is a white salt build up around the pot drainage holes it is a good indication that the pot should have a flush of water. Luckily in most parts of Tasmania we do not have to worry about water acidity or alkalinity.

A handful of Dynamic Lifter per 200-300 mm pot at this stage of the year will be beneficial as they use more fertilizer than the true epiphytic type orchid. Almost all orchids require good air movement and this applies equally to cymbidiums. Most orchid species grow in tree tops or on the side of hills where there is plenty of air movement.

When repotting one notices that roots gravitate to the sides of the pots. The sun on the black pots enhances root vigour. Notice that most roots are at the outside and not in the pot's middle.

As you select pots for repotting give a good visual inspection for woolly aphids and spider mites, ear-wigs slaters and Argentine ants. I use Optigard ant bait gel for the last of these pests and although expensive it certainly works. It is a constant battle as you can't hop the neighbours fence.

At the same time check leaves for the suspicious signs of virus and put suspect plants aside until you are certain of this condition. The young new growths are the best indicators of virus with a pronounced light streaking in the growth. Insect pests are one of the major reasons for virus transfer from plant to plant so stay on top of them.

Laelias and Oncidiums

Well, the show is over for another year so it's now that exciting time ahead, tidying plants, repotting and just generally preparing for the new growing period.

It's now a matter of setting our priorities and developing a routine as far as your spare time will allow,

As an example I am starting with my laelias. A few of them were repotted last year but due to unforeseen circumstances, most missed out. I'm talking *Laelia anceps*, incidentally, the others will follow.

Last year's repots will be checked over, old husks removed and they will be given a dose of Dynamic Lifter. This is the basic form with no added elements. At the same time I'll be checking for scale.

The dose is minimal, roughly a teaspoon to a 125mm pot scaled up or down according to pot size. It is placed as one unit adjacent to the new growth. If more than one growth, split accordingly.

It is then misted with a hand sprayer to settle it and also start decomposition. From then on each time you water the plant gets a taste. It is effective for about three months which effectively covers the new growth period. But don't get carried away by how much you use.

Do not spread around the pot as this reduces its long term effectiveness and to a point makes the potting mix impervious to water.

At the same time apply a small sprinkling of Baysol or similar to ward off slugs and snails which quickly decimate your new root tips and then group plants together on the bench. A good watering beforehand is not a bad idea.

As you repot those requiring it, give them the same treatment. Any others not ready for repotting will also benefit from a clean-up and feed.

Protecting those roots from marauders can make a big difference to the plants progress at this time, in fact throughout the year.

I was given this advice by Peter Jackson of Orchids N' More a couple of years ago and can certainly vouch for its effectiveness.

After the *Laelia anceps* I will move around to other genera as and when they require repotting and give them the same treatment. And of course, those not being repotted will receive their clean and feed but not with the same priority.

I prefer to repot as the new growths are emerging knowing that roots will soon follow so avoiding damage to the as yet unseen root tips. Unfortunately everything seems to happen at once but that is life.

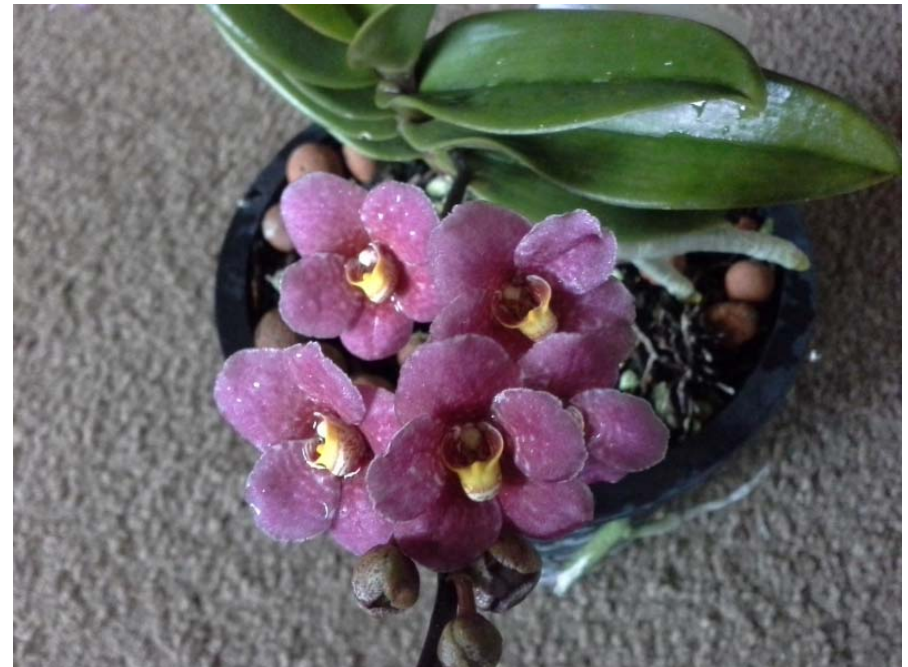
Sarcochilus

Many new members will have joined us in September at the Spring Show. Welcome. These notes are written with you in mind.

1. What are sarcochilus? They are small orchids with very attractive

flowers. An example is shown here. It is *Sarcochilus* Burgundy on Ice 'Mark's Gift'. The flower is about 2.5cm, or an inch, across. An important point is that they are Australian natives. Have a look for more examples on the net or in any good general orchid book.

2. Why grow sarcochilus? Apart from their good looks, they are very easy to grow and are ideal beginner's orchids. Just because they are easy, don't be misled. *Sarcochilus* shows are very competitive. Some of the state's top growers breed sarcs and the competition is tough. But, you can grow whatever you like. There are some wonderful novelty types that you and I may like, but an orchid judge would not grant a second look. *Sarcochilus* can be grown on a deck, verandah, under the eaves, under a tree and in a greenhouse. They will take down to very low temperatures, but should not get a frost on them. Be warned, sarcochilus are small plants and slow growers. Come along to the *Sarcochilus* and *Masdevallia* Show on 5



November at Legacy Hall, where we have our meetings. There you can buy yourself an established plant that will flower reliably.

How do I grow sarcochilus? Firstly, which pot to use? I prefer mesh pots, which are available from hydroponic shops or on line. These let air at the roots as sarcochilus are epiphytes or lithophytes. They need a very open growing medium. Buy a cheap 6mm or quarter inch sieve and anything that goes through is not suitable for sarcs. You can use pine bark or Fernmania. I prefer Fernmania and so do the top growers in the state. Mix this 1:1 with a material that does not break down. I prefer expanded clay balls, which are available from hydroponic shops, or you could use scoria or coarse perlite. Scoria is heavy and perlite can be messy. Some growers use just Fernmania, but you will have to keep your eye on not overwatering if you do this. The 1:1 mix in a mesh pot is foolproof. Fertilise weakly weekly. That means any good quality soluble fertiliser at half strength. These are mainly not complete, despite claims that they are. They generally contain no calcium and usually no magnesium, so add a pinch of dolomite to the top of pot. Do not use garden lime, because it contains no magnesium. Watering requires judgement. Water your orchid in the pot and feel the weight. Water when the weight is much reduced. With a little practice you will get quite good at this. Sarcochilus are virtually disease and pest free, but check for mealy bug, normal and woolly aphids and scale. These can be rubbed off or dabbed with methylated spirits on a cotton bud. Place your orchid in a cool, shady and frost free position and wait for the flowers that will come in surprisingly large numbers.

Where do I get sarcochilus? Initially, get a few established plants from the sarcochilus and masdevallia shows in Hobart, Launceston and Devonport in November. Peter and Helen Jackson will have Sarcochilus and other orchids for sale on 22 October at Sulphur Creek. Tinonee Orchid Nursery, Australian Orchid Nursery and Hanging Garden Nursery have them available on the net and can legally send to Tasmania. There are sellers on

ebay, but do not purchase from growers that should not send to Tasmania. Some of these will send to Tasmania, but it is wrong and not worth the risk.

Sarcochilus are fine orchids and easy to grow. Join the elite growers.

Native Dendrobiums

Now is the time of the year when collections can be cleaned up and given a spring clean.

As flowers die off, remove old racemes, trim broken and damaged leaves, remove dead leaves, dried and withered canes and keikis.

The media you use for repotting / potting on may be pure radiata pine bark to which you can add quartz gravel, chopped up bracken fern, manfern fronds and leaf litter.

Potting on. Remove plant from pot and gently tease roots out without removing potting media. Place into a larger pot and pack new mix around the root ball, taking care not to break any roots.

Repotting. Remove all old mix from around the roots, hose off if necessary, so that you can see what you have and a clear view of root conditions. Place in a pot, allowing space for two to three years growth, ensure mix gets among roots and is the plant is held firmly in the pot by the new mix.

Plants can be split and old canes cut away before repotting. Take care not to damage or break new growths.

Keikis can be grown on to create new plants. Water plants thoroughly and fertilise regularly during the growing season

Pleiones

Well what a season we have just experienced, it has been one of the most mixed up that I can remember. Consequently my stock of Pleione have suffered, those that have flowered show signs of prolonged cold and moist conditions. In their natural habitat this genus experience a cold but dry period of dormancy, some of them even covered with snow.

Conditions here are far from ideal, but I thought I was doing fairly well until I saw what other members had entered in the show and I have to say I am very pleased for them especially Bev.

Culturally, as the flowers begin to fade and the leaves reach about 10cm watering can increase to almost daily, the idea is to try to emulate the monsoonal rains that occur in their natural habitat where it rains heavily for 6 to 8 weeks. The main requirement is the mix must be very free draining but able to retain moisture, which is a neat trick. Fertilising can also begin using a high nitrogen liquid feed at about a quarter of a teaspoon to a nine litre bucket of water and applied every 8 to 10 days.

Remember Pleiones are shade loving, but still require good light therefore will do well in a shade house or out side under cover so that can control watering.

Leaf tip die back is a problem which Pleione seem to be particularly prone to and is due to a lack of calcium and is manifested during those very hot days we experience in summer. This may be minimised by applications of granular dolomite lime sprinkled over the surface of the mix and needs to be done a few days prior to forecast hot days and well watered in.

Watch out for snails and slugs, as they have like to have a nibble at the newly forming bulbs, especially the garlic snails. Treat with the appropriate baits like Baysol @ but is better if ground into a powder then sprinkled on.
